

Introduction

- Partnership Agreement overarching strategy delineates the main areas of intervention under the European Structural and Investment Funds
- European Structural and Investment Funds
 - European Regional Development Fund (ERDF)
 - Cohesion Fund (CF)
 - Just Transition Fund (JTF)
 - European Social Plus Fund (ESF+)
 - European Maritime, Fisheries and Aquaculture Fund (EMFAF)



ESF+ Programme

- A total of Five Priorities are financed through ESF+ funds
- Priorities 1 to 5 funded under **ESF+** with key priority areas including:
- □ Priority 1: Enhancing employability and labour market resilience;
- □Priority 2: Fostering active inclusion for all;
- □ Priority 3: Quality and inclusive education and enhanced lifelong learning for growth;
- ☐ Priority 4: Addressing material deprivation; and
- □ Priority 5: Enhancing social innovation.

The applicable **co-financing rate** for the 2021-2027 Programme is:

60% EU share and 40% MT share



Call for Project Proposals

Priority: 2. Fostering Active Inclusion for All.

Specific objective: ESO4.8. Fostering active inclusion with a view to promoting equal opportunities, non-discrimination and active participation, and improving employability, in particular for disadvantaged groups.

Restricted call for NGOs, VOs and Social Partners for projects not exceeding €200,000.

Budget Allocation for Call 12 is €1,500,000.



Call for Project Proposals

Priority: 2. Fostering Active Inclusion for All.

- Specific objective: ESO4.11. Enhancing the equal and timely access to quality, sustainable
 and affordable services, including services that promote the access to housing and personcentred care including healthcare; modernising social protection systems, including promoting
 access to social protection, with a particular focus on children and disadvantaged groups;
 improving accessibility including for persons with disabilities, effectiveness and resilience of
 healthcare systems and long-term care services.
- Restricted call for NGOs, VOs and Social Partners for projects not exceeding €200,000.
- Budget Allocation for Call 13 is €1,500,000.



Two-stage approach

- The application process is implemented into a two-stage approach.
 - Stage 1 Submission of the first stage project proposal
 - Stage 2 Submission of the full application including supplementary

Stage 1 – Application process

This will include critical information including but not limited to:

- General details on the applicant organisation and partners
- The applicable specific objective and expected results
- The targeted cohorts and the related indicators
- Financial plan and the activities being proposed.



Meetings with Applicants

 Following the submission of the proposal, the budget will be assessed, and the form of financing will be discussed with the applicant.

The aim of these meetings is to simplify the proposed budget.



Stage 2 – Application process

 Subsequently, applicants will be invited to submit the full application at this stage.

 The Project Selection Committee (PSC) will then evaluate all submissions in line with the eligibility and selection criteria.



Key Questions to be asked

- Are you an Eligible Applicant?
- Is the project in line with the scope of the relevant source of funds?
- Do the project activities fit within the Priority and Specific
 Objectives currently open under these calls?



General Principles

- The selection process is carried out by the Project Selection Committee (PSC).
- The PSC will rank the project proposals. A minimum score of 50% must be obtained.
- If an applicant wishes to proceed with a grievance on the outcome of the PSC, then the applicant may send a request of appeal to the **Project** Selection Appeals Board.

Contribution towards indicators

What are indicators?

• Indicators (OUTPUT and RESULT) are numerical targets to be achieved as a result of EU support.

• Each project needs to contribute to at least one output and one result indicator from Malta's ESF+ Programme.



Contribution towards indicators

Difference between output and result indicators:

- Output indicators:
 - Measure the direct deliverables of a project
 - They record the point of entry of participants at the start of the Project.
- Result indicators:
 - Measure the effects of a project (the change)
 - For project participants, they record the situation at the **end** of the Project (ex: 4 weeks / 6 months after)



Common ESF+ Indicators (Annex I of ESF+ Regulation)



Apart from the indicator tables in the ESF+ Programme, projects need to contribute also to the **common indicators** which are listed in the ESF+ Regulation – **Annex I, II, III** (Annex I applies to the majority of projects).

- Applicants do <u>NOT</u> need to include the common indicators from the Annexes in their Application Form (choose only from the tables in the Malta ESF Programme).
- However, indicator reporting <u>WILL</u> include these common indicators during the course of project implementation.
- The MA will provide a 'Data on Participants Form' and a reporting template to assist Beneficiaries in collecting and reporting this data related to the common indicators.
