

What is ESF (MALTA) all about?

The European Social Fund, ESF, finances projects that aim at improving peoples' lives through programmes intended to teach people new skills or strengthen existing ones leading them in finding better jobs. The objective of Malta ESF *Operational Programme II - Investing in human capital to create more opportunities and promote the wellbeing of society* (2014-2020) is to support people in increasing their employability; supporting inclusion, particularly for those at a higher risk of exclusion; improving educational attainment; and improving the delivery of the public service while supporting social partners to engage in dialogue with government.

The financial allocations in the respective areas are the following:




No calls for new projects were issued in 2018 since ESF Malta focused on finalising the assessment of projects that had been received. Any upcoming call for projects will be advertised on all local newspapers and on www.eufunds.gov.mt (under OPEN CALLS Section).

Progress by end of 2018

Whilst in 2017 the implementation of operations started to gain momentum, in 2018 implementation started to peak with forty-one (41) operations, including two Aid schemes, under implementation. The list of operations and Aid schemes can be found on www.eufunds.gov.mt.

From the beginning of the programme up to the end of 2018, three calls for projects were issued. As a result of call 3, in 2018, sixteen (16) new projects have been approved for an additional investment of €24.6M. In view of this, the total funds committed under the Programme has increased and, as at end of year stood at €137.9M, which represents 104.2% of the total funds available, as depicted in the table below.



Progress has been registered also under the two Aid schemes: Access to Employment (A2E) and Investing in Skills (IIS), both implemented by Jobsplus. Enterprises continued to submit applications for grants through the open call system adopted under both schemes. As at end of 2018, a total number of 1156 applications by the private sector were approved for EU assistance, amounting to €7.8M. 
This intense level of activity has resulted in concrete results being registered in terms of participants of ESF projects, with a total of 16,342 participants (of which 51% women) benefitting from ESF interventions during the current programming period, of which over 8,000¹ participants benefitted from ESF actions across all Priority Axes (PAs) in 2018. Out of these, 52% were women² whilst 27% were unemployed or inactive. Participants started also accessing employment, gaining certification and/or qualifications whilst a number of research projects were under implementation. From the financial aspect, the Programme has also managed to make strong headway in 2018 reaching €42.2Mof expenditure disbursed by the end of the year.

Thanks to all the implemented actions and to the efforts of all the stakeholders involved, the Programme managed to achieve all the milestones set for 2018 under the performance framework (PF) which consist of financial and output indicators. All PAs, in fact registered successful achievements on all performance indicators and financial milestones.

Results achieved as at the end of 2018

Given that Malta's sole natural resource is the human capacity, the ESF contribution continues to be crucial for the attainment of a more knowledgeable and competitive workforce.

As anticipated, in terms of achievements on the ground, over 16,000 people benefitting from actions supported through ESF funding, addressing the following categories.

PA 1 – Employment	this axis.
	Total funding amounts to €26M .
	The aim is to enhance employment opportunities with a view to improve employment prospects of different target groups and reducing the unemployment levels of youths.
	A total of 5,222 participants benefited from Projects/actions being implemented out of which 2,632 participants were youths.
	Enhance employment opportunities for job seekers/workers with a view to improve employment prospects is the objective of <i>Training for Employment</i> , which has registered significant results by 2018. Specifically, 1,565 participants were supported under <i>Training for Employment</i> , out of which 30% were in employment upon leaving
	Increasing employment opportunities for current NEETs as well as on those at risk of becoming NEETs or young unemployed through training and personalised assistance reducing their risk of becoming long-term unemployed is the aim of Youth Guarantee 02 . A total number of 2632 youths benefited from this project out of which 77% managed to be in education/training, gaining a qualification/certification or in employment, including self employment, by end of 2018.
	With regards to the Access to Employment Scheme (A2E) implemented by Jobsplus, which aims at enhancing opportunities to access the labour market and providing work experience to those furthest away from gainful employment, as at the end of 2018, there were 1,025 participants benefitting of this scheme. Of these 48% were women3 and 25% were persons with disabilities
PA 2 – Social Inclusion	Thirteen projects were under implementation in 2018. Total EU Funding amounts to €40.3Mil.

Nine projects are related to active inclusion of vulnerable groups and **four projects** are related to access to high quality services, including health care and social services of general interest. As at end 2018 a total of 3,138 participants benefited from projects being implemented under Priority Axis 2 of which 1,379 were women, 747 were inactive, 1,492 unemployed and 899 in employment.

Projects such as **VASTE** continued their implementation during the year under review, achieving their first results on the ground, such as the creation of the Vocational Multi-Disciplinary Assessment Centre to assist persons with vulnerability; multiple training and support, such as pre-employment training; sheltered employment training. The project saw over 900 participants benefetting of the various services. The Work Programme Initiative, provided individual profiling, training and work placement and, as a result, saw, by end of 2018, 1533 participants involved, 161 in employment further studies and 1063 participants gained qualification/certification. Other projects under this PA were launched in 2018 and geared up in terms of implementation throughout the year. Of these **INK** project offers training and job shadowing programme to equip vulnerable participants with skills for employment and independent living. As at end 2018, 149 participants benefitted from this project's activities. Of particular relevance under this PA is the project being implemented by Richmond Foundation, Mental Health first aid for youth. This project is equipping different cohorts and tailored a training programme to reach different groups namely educators, employers, youth and youth leaders and secondary and higher secondary students with the aim to train individuals in detecting symptoms of mental illnesses and direct that individual to seek professional help. During the year under review, 192 participants, participated in the project activities.

PA 3 - Education

Ten projects were under implementation in 2018 with a total EU Funding amount of €48.1M. By end of year, a total of 6,658 participants of which 3,689 were women participated in training under this axis.

Aiming reducing early school leaving, the **One Tablet per Child** project continued with the distribution of tablets in schools which went beyond the immediate cohort (i.e. teachers and students) to

include also to related centres and units such as the resource centre for special Education Needs.

Following the success of the first three calls under the **Endeavour** scholarships scheme another call was issued in 2018, with the most popular priority area being STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) followed by financial services and life sciences.

Looking at post-doctoral grants, under Reach High Scholars Programme, 15 awardees were carrying out their research and by the end of year under review most scholars were finalising the different research activities. With regards to the **Investing in skills scheme**, intended to promote access to training of persons actively participating in the Maltese Labour market, with a view to increasing productivity and enhancing adaptability, continued to be implemented in 2018. During the year under review, 2,870 persons were supported through the scheme with a total investment of €582,368. By end 2018, 660 Grant agreements were signed for a total value of €1,140,530. During the year under review a total of 183 SMEs and 34 large unique enterprises benefitted from this Scheme. The IB launched an awareness campaign to help increase the uptake of the scheme.

In 2018, four projects were approved aiming at facilitating the transition from education to work, and strengthening vocational education and training systems and their quality, bringing the total number of projects undet this PA to 10. Their implementation is expected to gain momentum in 2019.

Fifteen projects are currently being implemented with a total funding amounting to 14.7 Mil.

As at end 2018, a total of 1324 participants benefited from projects being implemented under this axis out of which 644 participants were women, 7 were inactive, 1 unemployed and 1316 in employment. Such figures are expected to see an increase in 2019, once project implementation continues to pick up pace.

Key actions implemented by approved projects in 2018 included but were not limited to specific training such as in the areas of arts and culture, geospatial training as well as training to public officials of a more general nature both locally and internationally, scholarships for public officers, international events, academic sponsorships, participation in study visits, side international meetings, research / studies as well as various publicity initiatives such as awareness
