



# **Objectives of the Database**



- The Migration and Security Information System (MSIS) has been launched in June 2016. The objectives of this database are: the recording and storing of data for the monitoring, evaluation, financial management, verifications and audits.
- 2,929 claims for payment have been processed under ISF (727 under ISF Police and 2202 under ISF Borders and Visas) whereas 4,434 claims for payment have been processed under the AMIF. These do not include payments processed through Technical Assistance.
